

WHAT IS PRACTICAL LIFE?

In 'The Secret of Childhood' Dr Maria Montessori called exercises from her Practical Life area 'formative activities' since their purpose is to form the child into an individual that is able to succeed in life. Washing hands, getting dressed, peeling vegetables, cutting, glueing, pouring, drying are all examples of practical life exercises.

"The children love to do these things for themselves and they learn to be careful and precise in their movements". Maria Montessori

Each time a child performs one of these activities, there is much more going on than meets the eye. Even when a child is spending an hour at the easel and producing only lines and squiggles for the umpteenth time in a month, that child is constantly taking in experiential knowledge from their environment, perfecting his fine motor skills and laying a foundation for future learning. Often the greatest gift we can give children is patience. Patience means waiting while we adults learn that hours spent drawing randomly on a chalkboard can suddenly turn into exquisite handwriting or pouring beans from container to container is the

In the same way that the Practical Life exercises support children as individuals in the formative years they continue to support the children as they grow and develop.

In the early years they create the foundation for fine motor skills, independence and concentration. The children then use these skills practically within their own Senior Class environments and as they branch into society and the world they feed their ever growing curiosity, intellect and caring for fellow humans.

Practical Life activities, one can therefore say, are the foundations for the child's connection to each other and humanity at large.

Two recent examples that stand out are letters to and from Dr Luke O'Neil and President Higgins inviting him to our 70th celebration and the 9-12 Class organising visits to the Orchard Day Care Centre.

Following the children's interests and needs, here again we 'follow the child' preparing them as they venture into the larger world.
